Before the AAG Get-together, we had had another successful get-together in an even bigger conference, AGU. Thanks to Hongjie and his committee, 23 people participated in this event, almost tripled the number compared with last year, showing that CPGIS' influence is quickly expanding.

Bylaws amendments approved

Members of CPGIS,

By Nov 16, 2010, 49 ballots were received. The results are summarized below.

1. Every year 50% of the BOD positions are to be re-elected. Yes (44) No (3) Abstain (2)

2 The BOD Election Committee should be formed by BOD members who will stay on the BOD.

Yes (42) No (5) Abstain (2)

Contingent upon the 3. approval of the Petition about Presidential BOD members, the three (3) Presidential BOD members are not subject to the annual 50% BOD replacement.

Yes (47) No (1) Abstain (1)

4. The immediate past, present, and elected CPGIS Presidents automatically become BOD members. The person who is entitled to the BOD membership in this way will have her/his term on BOD terminated once she/he is not in any of the three positions.

Yes (42) No (4) Abstain (3)

5. The voting record of each BOD member should be open to all CPGIS members once the voting results are available.

Yes (47) No (1) Abstain (1)

6. Under the "ARTICLE II. Purposes" of the Bylaw, add the sentence as follows:

CPGIS BOD Column

BOD Meeting was hold during February 8 and 14 through e-mail communications

The focus of this BOD meeting was to review the general financial status of CPGIS and to discuss and approve the three budget requests for year 2010-11 from three CPGIS Committees.

The BOD expressed a concern about the general budget plan of CPGIS, especially given the current small budget operation we have. The BOD recommends that CPGIS Treasurer, Dr. Diansheng Guo, with the help from CPGIS President, Dr. Xun Shi, CPGIS General Secretary, Dr. Shuming Bao, and others, develop a revised CPGIS Financial Status Analysis and Prediction to be presented to the March BOD meeting for further review and discussion.

The BOD meeting reviewed and discussed the budget requests. The related three committees are asked to revise their budget requests and resubmit them to March BOD meeting if appropriate. The BOD recommends that, at this stage of CPGIS development,all CPGIS awards (except for Best Student Paper Awards) are honorable rather than monetary.

BODS hold two virtual meetings during February and March of 2011 respectively. The focus of these two meetings was to review the general financial status of CPGIS, and to discuss and approve several committees' budget requests.

There were four major items for this month's BOD meeting:

(1) To officially vote to for a BOD resolution to adopt CPGIS Bylaws and the two Amendments (created and passed by then BOD in November 2007 and October 2010 respectively).

The purpose of this action was to facilitate the request from the lawyer's office with whom CPGIS has been working to apply for 501(C) 3 status.

The BOD resolved to accept the motion that CPGIS officially adopt the Bylaws and the two Amendments

- The BOD resolved to fully support the GeoInformatics 2012 Conference and CPGIS 20th Anniversary Celebration proposal submitted by Hui Lin and his group.
- The BOD reviewed the Guidelines for CPGIS Headquarters and the Guidelines for CPGIS Financial Management

(2) To review, discuss and vote on GeoInformatics' 2012 Proposal submitted by Dr. Hui Lin and his group from the Chinese University of Hong Kong. The proposal was recommended to BOD by CPGIS Conference Site Selection Committee on May 16, 2011.

(3) To review and discuss the Guidelines for CPGIS Headquarters (draft) that was developed by Dr. Shuming Bao in October 2010).

(4) To review and discuss the Guidelines for CPGIS Financial Management (draft) that was developed by Drs. Xun Shi and Qiming Zhou in October 2010).

After review and discussion of the related documents, BOD voted on items (1) & (2):

- With a unanimous vote, the BOD resolved to accept the motion that CPGIS officially adopt the Bylaws and the two Amendments.
- With a very strong vote (11 yes and one "no vote"), the BOD resolved to fully support the GeoInformatics 2012 Conference and CPGIS 20th Anniversary Celebration proposal submitted by Hui Lin and his group.

The BOD reviewed the Guidelines for CPGIS Headquarters and the Guidelines for CPGIS Financial Management. The BOD felt that more discussion and investigation are necessary before conducting a BOD voting.

The next BOD meeting will be held on June 24 during GeoInformatics 2011 Conference in Shanghai.

We successfully conducted the second CPGIS get-together in AGU and had 23 attendants including 18 new persons from different countries and institutions, with most of them from USA. Advanced GeoInformation Science Training Program Report

Dear All,

Thank to the support from National Geomatics Center of China (NGCC) leaders including Director Zhigang Li, and Provost Peter Stearns and Dean Vikas Chandhoke of George Mason University (GMU), The "Advanced GeoInformation Science Certificate Program" for NGCC was successfully concluded. NGCC, GMU, NASA, USGS and ESRI sponsored this program. GMU, UC-Boulder, USGS (Reston and Rocky Mountain Mapping Center) and ESRI (Broomfield/CO and Redlands) collaboratively hosted the training. The class is led by Dr. Jie Jiang, Ms. Junhong Hu, and Dr. Yong Zhao.

Managed by the Center for Intelligent Spatial Computing at GMU and NGCC, the Program is a joint program among NGCC, GMU, and CPGIS to provide training to advanced GIScience professionals, coming from NGCC and information centers of provincial bureaus of surveying and mapping. Seventeen GeoInformation Science professionals from Beijing, Shandong, Shanxi, Hubei, Jiangxi, and Guangdong participated in this customized training program (Mar. 7 – April 12, 2011) at George Mason University, University of Colorado at Boulder, ESRI (Denver and Redlands), and USGS (Reston and Denver). The GMU site was managed by Profs. David Wong, Ruixin Yang, and Dr. Chen Xu. The Colorado site was managed by Prof. Ken Foote (AAG President), and Dr. Pinde Fu coordinated the activities at the ESRI headquarter at Redlands, CA. Doug Nebert hosted the USGS visit with his three colleagues. Chaowei Yang coordinated the overall program.

During the training program, professors and scientists from various universities, government agencies, and companies introduced various cutting-edge topics on Earth Observations systems (EOS), Spatial Statistics, EOS Data Systems, Geospatial Cyberinfrastructure, Web Services, Grid Computing, National Spatial Data Infrastructure/Geospatial One-Stop, the U.S. National Mapping project, Global Earth Observation System of Systems, Semantic/ontology, LBS, a variety of GeoInformation Science applications, and Retrospective on Digital Earth, Volunteered Geographic Information, Citizen Science, and Ontology/Knowledge systems.

All instructors worked very hard to support the training program.
