The Board of Directors of The International Association of Chinese Professionals in Geographic Information Sciences (CPGIS) held its September 2011 board meeting September 13 - 22, 2011. The current BOD members are:

There were four major items in the agenda of this BOD meeting:

- (1) To review, discuss, revise, and vote for CPGIS to adopt the Guidelines for CPGIS Financial Management.
- (2) To review, discuss, revise, and vote for CPGIS to adopt the Guidelines for CPGIS Headquarter Office.
- (3) To discuss and decide on a reward CPGIS is to grant to the Local Organizing Committee of GeoInformatics 2011 for their outstanding contribution to the Conference and CPGIS.
- (4) To discuss on issues related to the upcoming BOD and CPGIS President Elections.



After review and discussion of the related documents, BOD voted on three motions:

MOTION 1: <u>The Guidelines for CPGIS Headquarter Office</u> be fully adopted by CPGIS.

Motion passed with 12 YES, 0 NO, 0 ABSTAIN.

#### Note:

- The original Guidelines draft was developed by Xun Shi and Qiming Zhou in 2010; the draft was included in Aijun Chen's President Report 2010-11.
- BOD revised the draft and voted to fully adopt the revised document as guidelines for the future CPGIS financial operation.
- The BOD-approved Guidelines is included in Appendix I of this Minutes.

MOTION 2: The Guidelines for CPGIS Financial Management be fully adopted by CPGIS.

Motion passed with 12 YES, 0 NO, 0 ABSTAIN.

#### Note:

- The original Guidelines draft was initiated by Shuming Bao in 2010; the draft was included in Aijun Chen's President Report 2010-11.
- BOD revised the draft and voted to fully adopt the revised document as guidelines for the future operation of CPGIS Headquarter Office.
- The BOD-approved Guidelines is included in Appendix II of this Minutes.

**MOTION 3:** To grant 10% of the total monetary income of CPGIS from the 2011 GeoInformatics Conference to the Local Organizing Committee as a reward. This is to appreciate the Committee's outstanding work for GeoInformatics 2011 and its contribution to CPGIS.

Motion passed with 11 YES, 0 NO, 1 ABSTAIN.

#### Note:

- This is a one-time reward and does not have to become a formal policy, since every year the situation can be different.
- We have about \$20,000 from the GeoInformatics 2011 Conference revenue in our CPGIS account we should have a precise count of the final number by the end of October after CPGIS receive the report from Local Organizing Committee.



1. Add more member benefits & activities

The purpose is to retain existing members and attract more new members. I propose that we:

- Add more award categories to encourage our members and benefit members' career development. In addition to the Service of Excellence and Best Student Papers awards we have in place, I proposed an Excellence in Education award, which has been approved by the BOD and will be issued annually at our Geoinformatics Conference. I will also propose new awards such as Excellence in Research and Excellence in Innovation.
- Provide monthly or bi-monthly webinars on subjects
  that are of interest to CPGIS members. The topics can be
  the recent advances in GI science and technology,
  entrepreneurship, curriculum development etc. These
  webinars can be very helpful for your teaching,
  research, and professional development.





- Add a "Latest Member's News" section to CPGIS website. The purpose is to give members more publicity and to bring our members closer. This section is dedicated to report your recent activities, e.g., awards, guest lecturing, attending conferences, publications, even personal news. I know you are busy and don't have time to write lengthy news, so to make it easy we can publish photo news (a couple photos with short captions).
- Build a wiki website for members to share useful materials. Many of us have collected rich teaching and researching resources. We need a web portal to share such resources. Instead of adding all the work to our webmaster, we can provide a wiki website, allowing you to share and find materials whenever you like.
- Get Together virtually: We are geographically scattered, and it's not easy for us to get together physically. We can help members get connected through social network such as LinkedIn, Facebook, Twitter, and Weibo (微博), expand members' professional networks.
- Establish more regional chapters in those regions with relatively more members, encourage regular local activities, such as giving guest lectures at each others' universities.

#### 2. Enhance the visibility of CPGIS

 Establish CPGIS Series Seminars: Many members have been giving guest seminars in China and abroad. These activities are undertaken on individual bases. I propose that we brand these lectures as "CPGIS Science & Technology Series Seminars" and that we encourage our members to use this brand when giving guest lectures.

- Promote CPGIS to a broader audience by building connections with various news media and by utilizing Twitter and Weibo.
- 3. Involve non-academic sectors

  CPGIS has been very successful in academia. Outside

  CPGIS, there are still a large number of GIS professionals

  in commercial companies, government agencies etc. We
  need to:
- Attract members from these sectors by expanding member benefits and activities (detailed above)
- Attract commercial marketing and advertising at CPGIS conferences, publications, and on the CPGIS website (we will need to enrich the contents of our website and attract more web visitors first).
- Request support of various forms from the commercial and government sectors: financial support, books, trainings, home/trial edition software, hosting student visits, student intern opportunities.
- Exchange ideas with the industry: Facilitate members to convert their research results to practical products & applications.

- 4. Expand the cooperation with China and sister organizations
- Sponsor more conferences in China
- Expand the Advanced GIScience training program: This very successful program was initiated and organized by Professor Chaowei Yang. This program so far focuses on the survey & mapping discipline. These are also opportunities in other disciplines, such as higher education, urban planning, and emergency management. CPGIS should support the expansion of this program.
- Facilitate international scholar exchanges: Help China professors (CPGIS members) to "Go Out". The Chinese Department of Education provides financial support to encourage professors to be visiting scholars in US and other countries. But still many China professors cannot find receiving institutes. CPGIS can provide a platform (e.g., using CPGIS email alias) to share such information as who has plans to "go out" and who can accept visiting scholars.
- Collaborate with other GIS and remote sensing organizations such as Chinese Association of GIS, Chinese government...

A one-year term goes by fast, and one individual's capability is always limited. But I will do my best to carry out the above initiatives. With the support and help of our BOD, all committees, and all of you, we can continue the success of our association and further expand that success.
